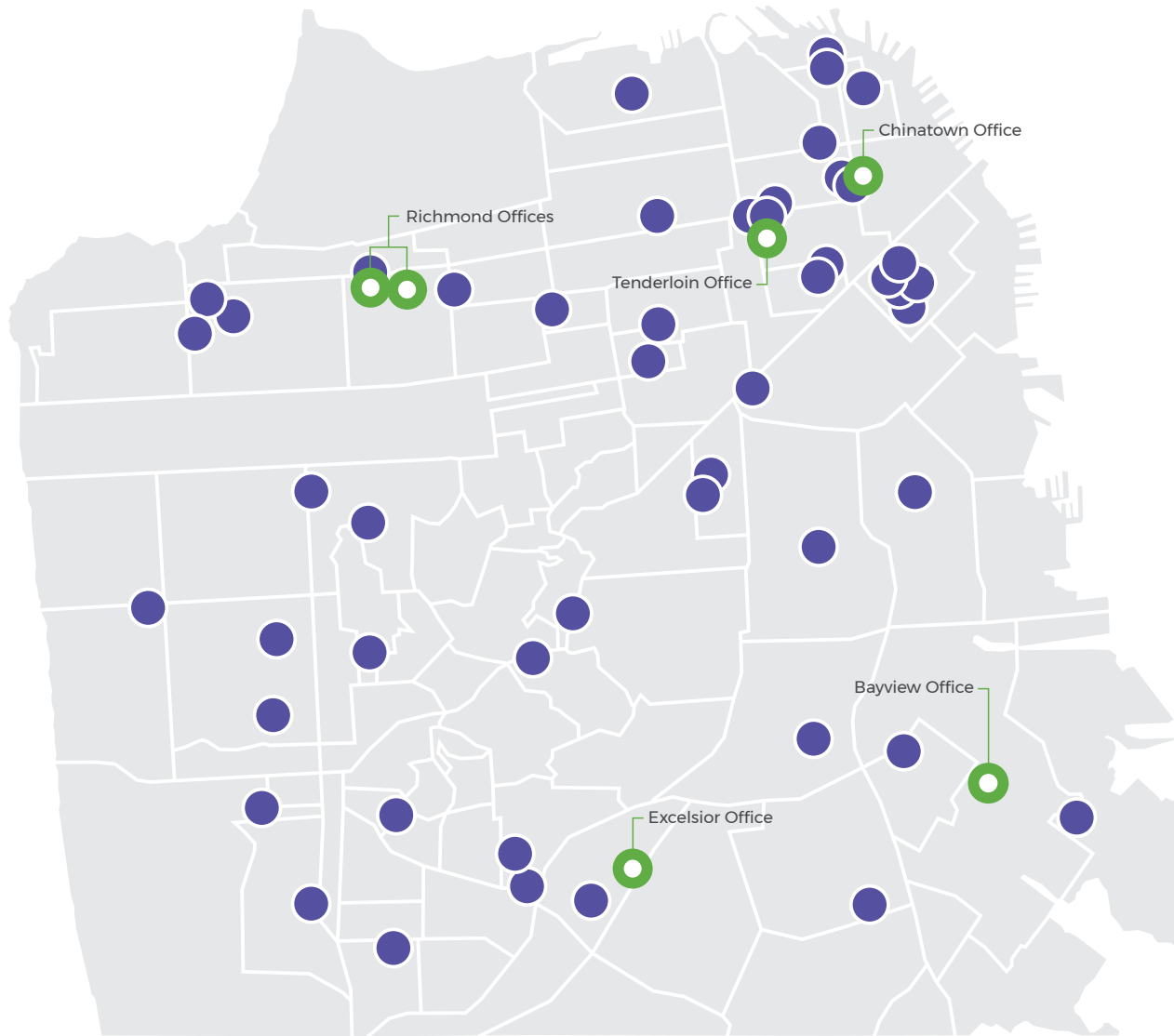

## CHINATOWN

CYC has its oldest roots in Chinatown and serves the community with direct services at our office located at the Willie “Woo Woo” Wong Playground, and as the host of several annual community events, including the Waverly Street Festivals and ongoing events at the Rose Pak Station Upper Plaza. Our Power Wash Mobile team is on the streets every morning and late at night, keeping the streets safe and offering valuable employment opportunities.



Chinatown is the heart of the local Chinese community, with irreplaceable resources for new immigrants, and Chinese families and businesses with long histories in San Francisco. This unique neighborhood also has very high density and a larger percentage of seniors than other neighborhoods in the city.



Through our table tennis program, digital literacy classes for seniors, drop-in and referral services, and community safety trainings, CYC ensures the community of Chinatown experiences safety, support, and connection across ages and throughout the year.



This past year's Lunar New Year Parade in Chinatown was particularly momentous for CYC. We welcomed the Year of the Dragon by unveiling our own colorful new dragon, symbolizing strength and prosperity, and uniting the Chinatown community.

## TENDERLOIN

CYC has long maintained our Tenderloin office to stay close to those who rely on our support and to create an accessible central location in the heart of the city for all our communities and programs.



In the Tenderloin, CYC offers afterschool programs at Redding Elementary School, ensuring that the diverse, young children growing up in the Tenderloin receive culturally and linguistically sensitive care, and have their creativity and personhood honored from an early age.

## EXCELSIOR AND THE MISSION

This past year, we celebrated our first full year operating the new Excelsior community service center, deepening our support for a neighborhood where we have long had strong ties.



The Excelsior is home to many first-generation immigrants who face daily cultural, linguistic, and practical challenges. Through the new center, CYC provides consistent and accessible support that's culturally and linguistically attuned to the local community. The lifeline we offer includes:

- Transportation information
- Technology classes
- Housing referrals
- Medi-Cal assistance
- CalFresh assistance







## BAYVIEW

Bayview's history is one that includes heartache and rapid change.

### Seeing the Bayview

One of our most cherished programs in Bayview is the Bayview Hunters Point Solidarity Tour, aimed at strengthening ties and understanding across diverse groups in the Bayview area. This tour is now in its 11th year and is instrumental in promoting racial harmony and solidarity by facilitating a deeper understanding of the unique histories and shared experiences of the neighborhood's residents. With a focus on social justice, the tour explores the commonalities in the migration stories and struggles faced by Black and Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) communities, among others, who have made Bayview their home.

to differences, needs, and place. Working with local organizations, CYC conducts workshops on digital literacy, financial literacy, life skills, and safety, which foster multicultural exchange and dispel stereotypes.



### Celebrating the Bayview

This past year, the Bayview community celebrated the 14th Annual Bayview Black History Month and Lunar New Year Celebration, in collaboration with the Bayview YMCA, Chinatown Community Development Center and CYC. The event highlighted the neighborhood's cultural diversity, with artistic performances, scrumptious soul food, and authentic Chinese dishes representing Bayview's AAPI and African American communities. Events like these are crucial in bridging cultural divides and fostering mutual understanding and respect.







## RICHMOND

CYC workforce development programs continued to thrive in the Richmond this past year, and the new Richmond Community Hub made final preparations to open its doors to many smiles, dragons, and fire crackers in August 2024.



The Richmond exemplifies the importance and success of the CYC program model, which emphasizes place-based adaptation and carefully nurtured trust with local community partners.



The Richmond has much lower density than many other San Francisco neighborhoods, with a diverse community that includes many non-English speakers, low-income families, and seniors. The new Hub ensures that Richmond residents have a place where they feel at home.







## SUNSET AND INGLESIDE

On the west side of the city, in addition to our work in the Richmond, CYC remains very active in Ingleside and the Sunset, offering summer programs that serve more than 100 youth per year, as well as the Mayor's Youth Employment and Education program (MYEEP).



Our Aptos Beacon Center offers a comprehensive program that supports enrichment, educational, social, and emotional activities throughout the entire school day including after school.



And our District 7 Youth Council gives youth a platform to explore their interest in civic engagement and train them in leadership, facilitation, policy research, event planning, and community organizing skills.



## ACROSS SAN FRANCISCO

Across the city, CYC supports youth potential by connecting them to their communities and mobilizing those communities in return to support youth. Through our programs, we foster intergenerational connections and provide environments where young people develop agency, leadership skills, and a sense of purpose.



Our **digital literacy classes** are a powerful example of this. Youth volunteers from our Youth Community Engagement (YCE) program worked one-on-one with seniors, teaching them how to navigate social media, send messages, and browse the web. This initiative not only helps bridge the digital divide but also builds trust and solidarity across generations.



The annual **AAPI Youth Summit** showcased the creativity and potential of young leaders, bringing together almost 200 youth to explore their aspirations and concerns. This youth-driven event provided a platform for young people to lead discussions about their futures and their communities.



Youth leadership was also celebrated, and demonstrated, before a multi-generational audience in the Mission when Kali Dorabji Reyes and Eddy Jimenez, participants in CYC youth leadership programs, were invited to speak at the world premiere of *The Emissary*, an opera celebrating youth activism, ingenuity, and intergenerational solidarity. Hosted by the Opera Parallèle Bullhorn program, their conversation amplified the voices of young changemakers working to reshape their communities.

## ACROSS SAN FRANCISCO (CONTINUED)

Finally, our **community-driven approach** shines through in citywide events that celebrate cultural heritage and foster cross-cultural understanding. By partnering with local governments, merchants, community-based organizations, and residents, CYC creates inclusive spaces where diverse communities come together to connect, collaborate, and celebrate their shared humanity.



Across the city, **CYC Health and Wellness** services provide culturally and linguistically appropriate support for youth and families, addressing mental health, drug prevention, and violence prevention. Our programs offer therapy, case management, and parenting classes to reduce stigma and strengthen families, particularly in the AAPI community. For at-risk youth, our partnership with Community Assessment Referral Center provides an invaluable lifeline, connecting youth to counseling, crisis intervention, and pathways to positive growth.

CYC also plays a critical role in promoting safety and justice. As the fiscal agency for the **Coalition for Community Safety and Justice (CCSJ)**, we work with partners to provide coordinated street outreach, crisis response services, and education on community healing and restorative justice. This year, CCSJ released its first [Impact Report](#), highlighting the collaborative efforts of its partner organizations—Community Youth Center, Chinese for Affirmative Action, Chinatown Community Development Center, and Chinese Progressive Association. Collectively, these organizations have been reimagining personal and community safety for San Francisco's AAPI communities.

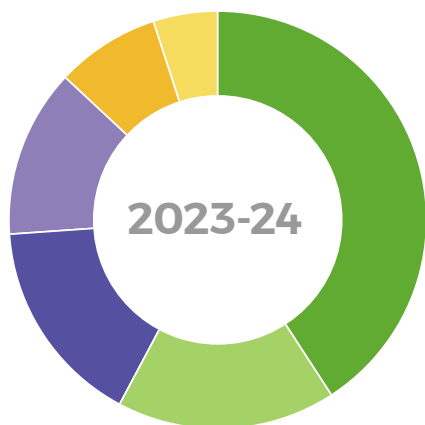






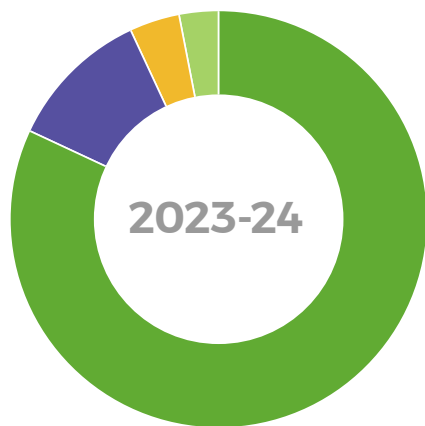

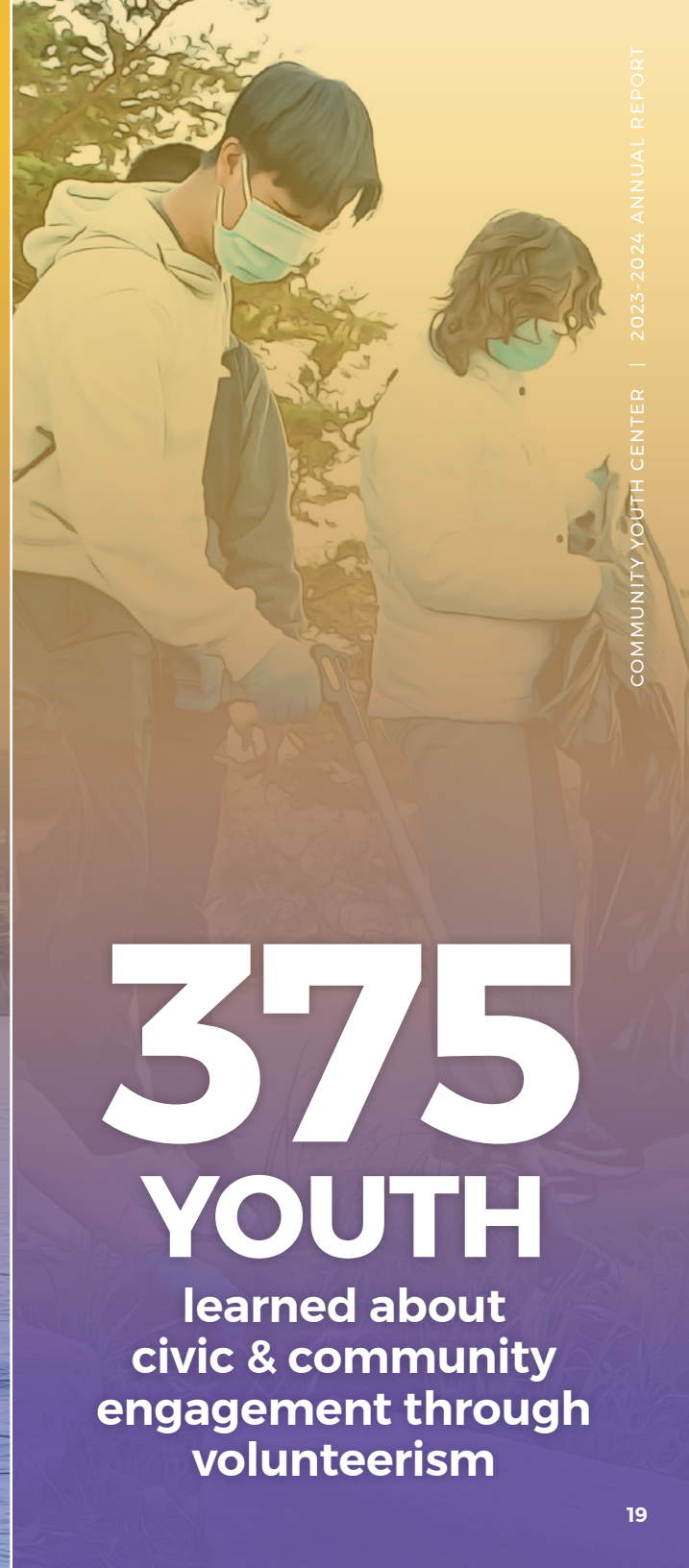
